Messenger letter

Dear Friends,

As the nights get longer and we move towards the shortest day of the year, the lights get stronger. The dark streets of our town are now illuminated by the colourful lights that herald the approach of Christmas. It is not only the official lights that we can enjoy, for each year more people decorate their homes with lights. It fills me with joy to see these, and, when I do, it reminds me of the deeper message of the light that comes into the world at Christmas.

Christmas is a feast of light, angels fill the night sky with a brilliant light, a star leads travellers from the East, and in a stable in Bethlehem a light shines that will bring hope to the world. But, according to St. John, that light is not a dominant light, it is a fragile light, a gentle light, a light that pierces the darkness. So, what sort of light is it that we celebrate at Christmas?

That is what our Advent journey will reveal. We will look at powerful words written by the Prophet Isaiah, words that were addressed to a people facing terrible upheaval in their lives, as all they knew was ripped away from them and they were taken into exile. They lived in exile for many years. What does light look like for people in exile? Isaiah shows them!

After Christmas we continue our journey into Epiphany. Now we will explore what the light looks like in practice. Advent, Christmas, Epiphany – three parts of the same journey and light shapes the whole journey.

What does that light look like for us as we face the

challenges of our time? The darkness is clear for us to see, violence, oppression, discrimination, war, and it can seem hard to celebrate Christmas against this backdrop. But that light came into the world in just such a time and it pierced the darkness. It is a light that nurtures hope, gains strength through justice and love, and finds fulfilment in peace. It enters our hearts, changes our view of the world and our attitudes to others, and then, through us, changes the world.

I pray that as we embark on this journey, we will feel that light piercing the darkness, strengthening us in our service and radiating, through us, into the world.

May Advent inspire you with a renewed vision; Christmas fill you with love, and Epiphany challenge you in service.



What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding refers to both the actions taken to promote the welfare of children/young people and adults, specifically putting preventative measures in place to protect those who are at risk of, or experiencing abuse, harm or neglect; and having effective



procedures in place should something go wrong. The URC's safeguarding policy Good Practice 6 defines a child as anyone under 18 years of age, and an adult as anyone aged 18 years or over. It recognises that, for certain purposes, Scottish law treats 16- and 17-year olds as adults. Adults at risk replaces the term 'vulnerable adults' and refers to adults who 'by reason of mental or other disability, age, illness or other situation are permanently, or for the time being, unable to take care of themselves, or to protect themselves against significant harm, abuse or exploitation.

Safeguarding and the URC

Safeguarding in the United Reformed Church is underpinned by Jesus' command to 'love one another as I have loved you' (John 13:34-35). The United Reformed Church Best practice, and the URC's aim, is that everyone involved in church life – as an expression of the love of God – shares the responsibility of protecting the most vulnerable and upholding the rights of the least powerful. Although the safeguarding coordinator may be seen as overseeing the church's safeguarding work, all church members and workers should be encouraged always to be vigilant and to play their part by:

 creating and maintaining a safe and inclusive environment for all, especially children and adults at risk, in which the dignity and rights of each person are respected acknowledging that the welfare of the child and adult at risk is paramount, and that the priority is always to act in their best interests

 responding without delay to every concern, incident or complaint which suggests that a child or adult has been harmed, or is at risk of harm

- challenging any abuse of power, especially where it involves someone in a position of trust
- managing risks and those who might pose a risk to the people and the welfare of the Church.



Taken together these steps will prevent the abuse and neglect of children and adults, and ensure the well-being and pastoral care of those who are or may be at risk.

On Monday 20th October our speaker was Jane McKeown, her talk was entitled "Music on the Move". She started her music career at 6 years old teaching herself to play the piano but was told she needed an instrument that she could carry around with her so had violin lessons and eventually the viola as fewer people play this instrument.

She was sent to a boarding school and joined an orchestra in Brighton which meant going out of the convent on her own, a real treat! She also learned to play the electric organ which led her to join many orchestras including the Huddersfield Philharmonic Orchestra, led by Sir Malcolm Sargent, who played with the Huddersfield Choral Society.

She and her husband moved 27 times in 32 years and she played in Denmark, Ireland, Belgium, England, Wales and U.S.A. Having 6 children, this was not easy but found making friends easier through Church, school, sports and music of course. They have 17 grandchildren and 14 of them play a musical instrument. She said music is good for team work, mental health, caring, physical stamina and fellowship. It is also very good for concentration and discipline for children.

On Monday 3rd November, Jason took the meeting. We welcomed Margaret Thompson to tell us the true and very poignant story about the loss of her father when she was a baby. She titled her story 'Wartime love lost and found', a very appropriate title being the week before Armistice Day.

Frank Bolton was shot down and a young boy in Holland collected bits of the plane. Eventually Margaret managed to find her fathers grave. In 2017, Margaret and all her family travelled together and met the man who held her fathers hand when he died! The man wept on meeting Margaret, in fact they wept together.

This story has been used many times by the War Graves Commission and newspapers. Unless you hear the story in Margarets' own words you could not possibly have the feeling that we all had on that Monday afternoon. Such a moving story. Thank You Margaret

On Monday 17th November it was Jacqui, our Vice-President, who led the meeting. After a hymn, a prayer and the birthdays, she introduced our speaker, Eric Jackson, who was talking on 'model villages, from Saltaire to Bourneville.

Population between 1801 and 1851 more than doubled as people moved from the country to the towns and cities. Slums were everywhere. Industrial model villages started to appear. In Scotland, New Lanark was built mostly of flats; they had rules to live and work by. Alllotments were provided too!

Locally Saltaire was built by mill owner Titus Salt for his workers. He built 224 dwellings, 44 alms houses, a chapel, a hospital and a massive factory. Bradford at that time was a terrible place to live with open sewers, so such an improvement was welcomed by the workers. All over the country these villages were built by mill and factory owners. Notably the Cadbury brothers built Bournville, Rowntrees in York built New Earswick and the Lever Brothers built Port Sunlight. It was very interesting to hear how all these model villages appeared during the nineteenth century. The afternoon finished with tea and biscuits.

OTLEY CONGREGATIONAL BAZAAR OF 1902

Andrew Howard, our church archivist recently set up a display in the transept of the church, featuring the Congregational Church Bazaar of 1902. The Bazaar raised money to pay off some of the debts incurred in the construction of the current church building.

As the blurb accompanying the exhibits stated a programme for the Bazaar was published and contained fascinating adverts from many of the business that were operating in Otley at the time.

It is interesting that the purpose of the bazaar was to raise money to pay for the building at a time when we are trying to fund the replacement of a major component of the original construction - the roof!!!
