

#### Messenger letter

Dear Friends,

At the very start I feel I must confess to writing this in the warm, sunny Canaries whilst you, apparently have been frozen and buffeted here in the UK.

By mid-February we will probably have endured most of the winter and already have observed or ignored Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday and entered the Church's famous (if grimmer than normal) season of Lent.

Do you think we will be doing the usual this year?

- Giving up something—like swearing, smoking, alcohol, using the car, chocolates (probably Jason is best qualified to answer the last one!)
- Taking up something—like getting fit, reading the bible, praying more, a bit of volunteering.

Actually, the Bridge Church has two such opportunities tailor made for us:

- Giving Groceries and toiletries to Shine Bradford starting Saturday 17th February.
- Taking up Bible Study with Jason starting Tuesday 20th February.

But, to ask a familiar question, what would Jesus do? The thing is, we're aware what he actually *did*: in a deserted place, for forty days, facing three big temptations or tests.

So what was happening? We know that by then he was a young man (probably late 20's) who had been acutely aware of God, "his Father", since childhood. His "ministry" followed right after these testing times so it seems he was sorting out his future, testing out what he might do and say and the best way of saying it, and living it.

So we might we be best advised to do something similar? Take stock and sort ourselves a bit; what should we prioritise; what would we say; how best we could say it, etc.

Sticking in the traditional channels it might still mean us giving up something, or taking uo, something new or different. But with a difference; it might last with us not for forty days, but for a lifetime - isnt that how it turned out for lesus?

Thank you for reading and thinking through this with me.

WELCOMING ALL IN FAITH AND LOVE

#### **MRS JEAN HODGSON**

This is part of the eulogy which Jason delivered at his funeral. Jean worshipped here for many years, becoming a member in September 1974, she was faithful until a combination of the pandemic and her declining health made that impossible. She remained, always in our prayers. So, it is fitting that we gather here to remember and celebrate the life of Jean Hodgson, a life filled with love.

Jean was born, Jean Elizabeth Jackson, on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1931, the

eldest of four siblings: John, Sheila, and Margaret. Jean attended the National School before moving on the North Parade School.

She left school at fourteen and worked for six months at Marsdens before moving on to Woolworths. It was at a Woolworth's Christmas Party that she met Bill, who was serving in the army and was based at Farnley Park.

They were married in December 1950 when Jean was 19 years old, Bill 21 years old. Their marriage was blessed with four children, Brian, Linda, Stuart, and Maria.



As Maria was starting school Jean and Bill started fostering and they fostered for 21 years. They also adopted Jean and Jeanette. Pauline, who came and lived with them stayed until she was married. Jean and Bill's family grew, they had fifteen grand-children and nine great-grandchildren. This is how Jean remembered her own life!

Her family would like to add some further memories. As we have heard, Jean's family grew, 15 Grandchildren and a growing number of much loved and welcomed Great-Grandchildren. Maria was able to take her newborn Grandson, Albie, to meet his great-Grandma Jean in hospital. Jean loved getting to know them all and they will greatly miss her.

Growing up Brian, Linda, Steven, and Maria remember lots of family holidays, mostly on the East Coast but also visiting relatives in Cambridgeshire. They also recall fun times at home, with lots of music and games with their Mum.

There were hikes up the Chevin and visits to Wharfe Meadows Park as well as exploring Weston Woods and the Clifton area.

After Bill's early retirement Jean and Bill explored the wider world, visiting America, Russia, and taking coach tours across Europe. The last time that I spoke with Jean she was reminiscing about her time in America as I shared with her my experiences of my summer there.

Jean always had pet cats and she adopted many a stray, giving them a cat's life of luxury.

In later life, when she was mostly housebound, she enjoyed watching re-runs of old crimes series on TV. She also had a varied interest in TV sports coverage, especially snooker, cycling, and the occasional football match. Her ever-expanding family visited her regularly and always made sure she had a fresh mug of tea by her side!

Jean Hodgson died on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> December 2023 aged 92 years. Her funeral service was held at The Bridge Church on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> January 2024.

With wonderful full colour photographs and a preface by journalist and broadcaster Jon Snow, it is an inspiring story of Friendship.



#### Mark Atkins Leeds Faith in Schools Update

To the wonderful members of the Churches in Otley, it really is my privilege write to you and update you on the incredibly exciting work that is happening with young people in the town in my role at Leeds Faith in Schools (LFiS). For more than 20 years, LFiS has provided Schools workers, based in Prince Henry's, seeking to be a Christian presence in the school and living out our vision of being 'Good News to the school' – its students, and the staff.

As a team of 6 we have Schools workers based in 10 different schools in and around Leeds and for the past 2 years I have worked in Prince Henry's on a Tuesday doing several things, including: 1-1 mentoring, boy's groups, a lunchtime club as well as the after-school drop-in youth club at Bridge Church.

In school, the demand for mentoring has grown significantly. In the wake of the pandemic and with school budgets becoming increasingly tighter we have been able to offer to take on some of the burden of schools' enormous backlog of students needing extra pastoral support, these students are referred to us as they may be struggling with anything with their mental health, their behaviour, and issues both at home and within school itself.

Mentoring provides the unique opportunity to build strong, trusted relationships with some incredibly vulnerable students. Oftentimes we are the first people to hear the deeply personal and, unfortunately, tragic reasons why these young people have been 'acting out' or showing other negative behaviours.

Mentoring enables us to show God's love to them in such a practical way. Many of the lads I see in Prince Henry's on a regular basis are at risk of permanent exclusion - many of them are involved in anti-social and/or criminal behaviour out of school. All have a lot of difficulty fitting in at school, some of them struggle with substance abuse and all of them have experienced some kind of major family breakdown.

At LFiS we are passionate believers in creating joy and fun wherever we go which is why we create spaces for young people to thrive in as we know how important it is for their development. Not only this but it also helps them open their hearts to us as followers of Christ. Drop-in provides an incredible safe space for young people to come and meet new people and enjoy themselves away from the pressure of school. I'm incredibly blessed to have a team of volunteers from Otley Parish Church (including Maria, the new youth worker), Bridge Church, Otley Methodist, New Life and Otley Catholic Church to help me run it.

I believe God's Kingdom is ready to break-through in Otley, and especially in the lives of the young people here. The churches have such an open heart to them and we are praying for God to do more.

We finished off the meeting by celebrating a few birthdays and sung 'Happy Birthday', especially to both our secretary and treasurer who both had special ones! Then we had a cup of tea and special chocolate biscuits brought by a member.

We thought you would be pleased to hear some exciting news from the Hollybush Project. We have been accepted to the Harrogate Flower Show in the 'Creative Borders' category.

We had a short time to place an entry. The learning disability team have created mood boards for their ideas and the creative borders design has been based on this, incorporating edibles in the form of a small 'square foot garden' area, a wildlife area incorporating of variety of grasses, a small pond and various wildlife habitats including a log pile, an insect hotel and a hedgehog house. A small bench provides a place to sit and relax with colourful planting in this area to stimulate the senses.

This will also allow us the opportunity to exhibit some of the woodwork and willow crafts created in house by the Hollybush team.

We are all very excited and we will get to planning properly in the new year.
