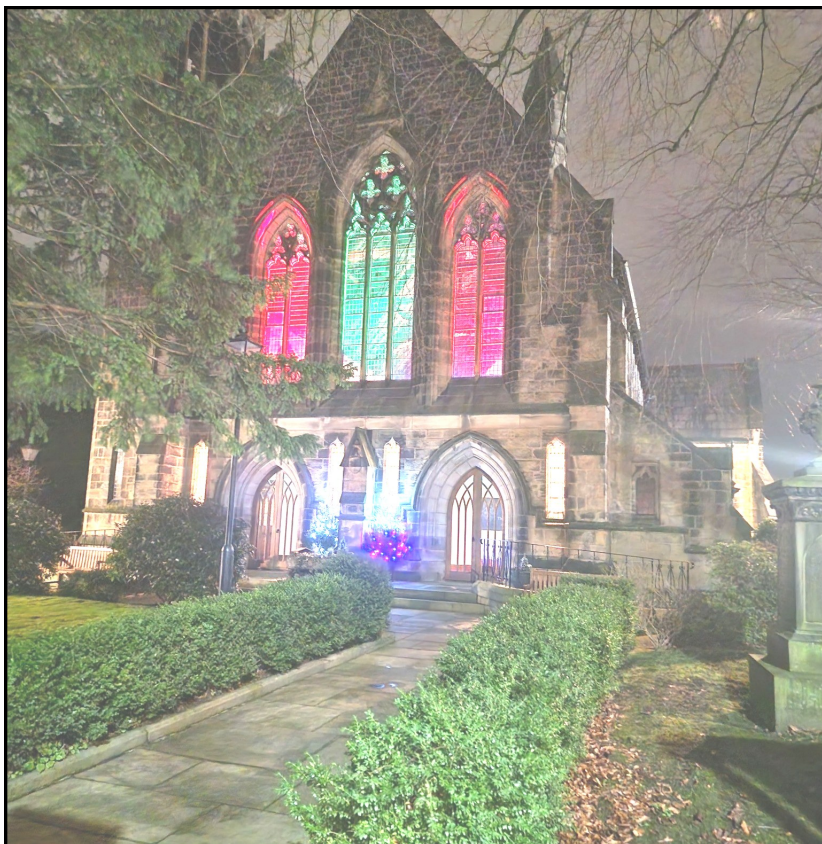

Messenger letter

Dear Friends,

As the celebration of Christmas fades and our Epiphany journey draws to a close, we embark on the season of Lent. If taken seriously, this is a difficult season, a time of wilderness and challenge, a time of reflection, repentance, and spiritual preparation that helps us to get ready to make our Holy Week pilgrimage and then celebrate Easter.

It is all too easy to enjoy the moments of celebration and skip over the time of self-examination, but the Church has long encouraged Christians to make this journey to remember the time Jesus spent in the wilderness testing his call. We are invited to give something up for Lent, not to help us lose weight or to save money, but to focus our minds and our hearts on the journey. We are invited to go without something so that when we do we think about why we are doing this. In recent years there has been a move towards taking things up in Lent, doing extra things, but the underlying reason is the same – do this to think about the journey. Both going without and taking something up are good ways to observe the season of Lent as long as we are focused on the journey, as long as we are focused on Jesus!

The late pope, Francis, reflecting on the Lenten pilgrimage, suggested we do both:

Fast from hurting words and say kind words.

Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.

Fast from anger and be filled with patience.

Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.

Fast from worries and have trust in God.

Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.

Fast from pressures and be prayerful.

Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy.

Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.

Fast from grudges and be reconciled.

Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

As we journey through Lent, and prepare for Holy Week and Easter, these seem to me to be good things to give up and good things to take on so that the journey we make is focused on Jesus!

We have previously had commentary on books of the New Testament by Canon Paul Hardingham - he has also done similar articles about Old Testament books ...

What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament: Job

'Why does God allow suffering?' This is a frequently asked question of Christians, because we believe in a God who is both good and powerful and it is explored in the book of Job. This book is part of the wisdom literature, along with Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

Job was both wealthy and righteous, yet he experienced catastrophic suffering, losing all his wealth, children and health. This is portrayed as a result of Satan's challenge to God, testing whether Job's devotion to God was dependent on his circumstances or not.

The main body of the book (3:1-42:6) consists of dialogues between Job, his friends (Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar) and God. Job and his friends assume that God is almighty and just, and that no human being is wholly innocent. In the three cycles of speeches they wrestle with the reasons for Job's suffering, remembering his morally upright character.

Finally, all are silenced by God, as He speaks Himself (chs 38-42). He points out that Job knows very little about the universe when he reflects on God's power. Job confesses his lack of understanding and weakness, but then goes on to confess his confidence and trust in God. This puts suffering in a right perspective. Job is not condemned, and the book ends with the restoration of his family and possessions.

The importance of this book is that it realistically addresses the painful questions of life, without offering simplistic answers. It focuses on *how* we should respond to suffering, rather than on *why* God allows suffering: *'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I shall depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised.'* (1:21)

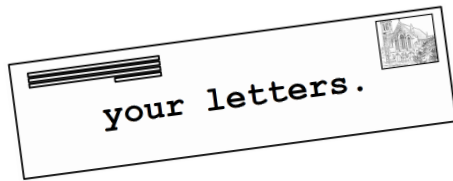

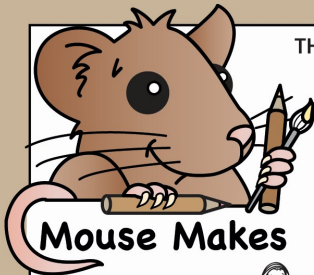
In January Denise Adlard came to speak on 'The Brontes of Howarth' describing the social conditions at that time and 'how Patrick met his wife Maria'.

It happened again.



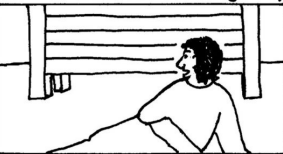
I didn't call. Go back to bed.

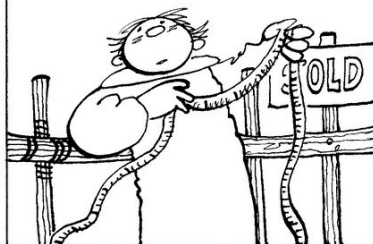

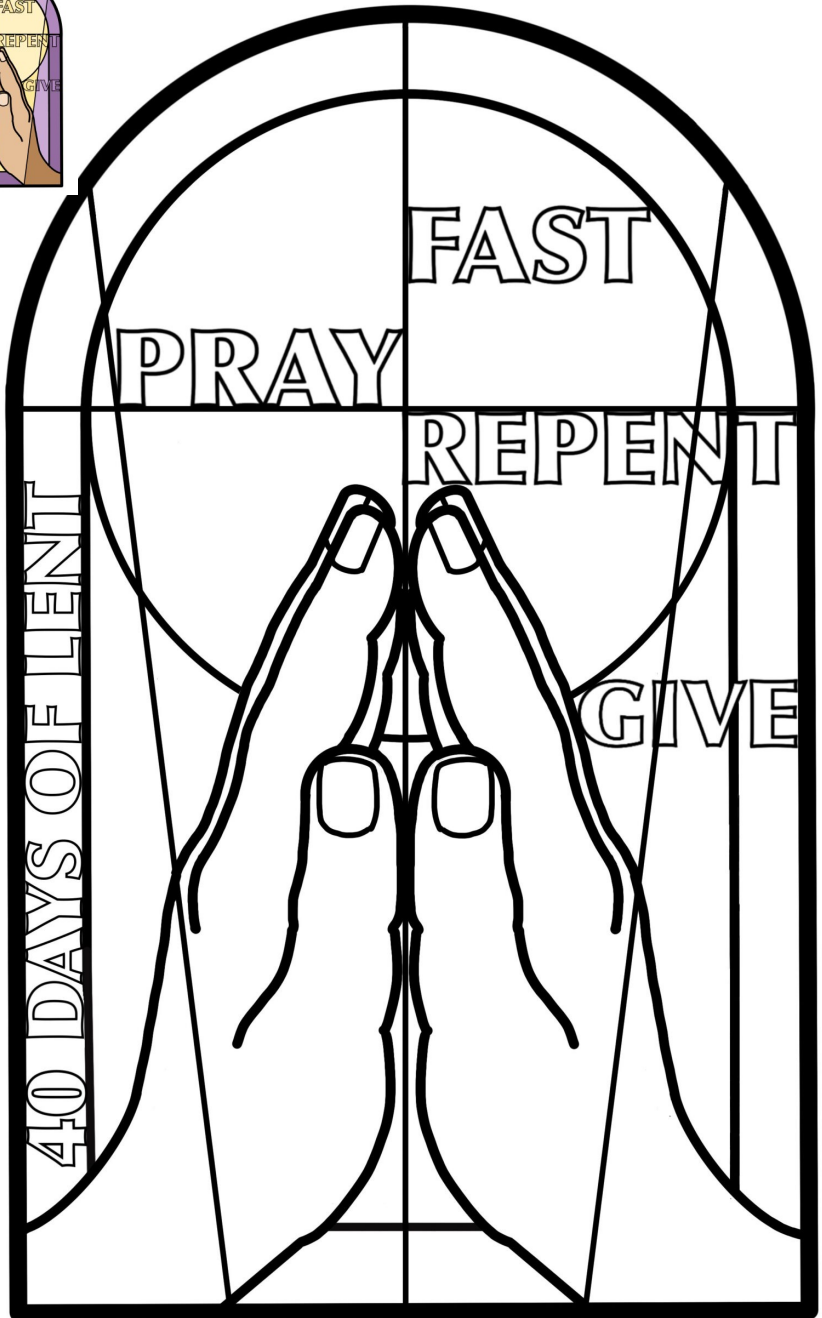

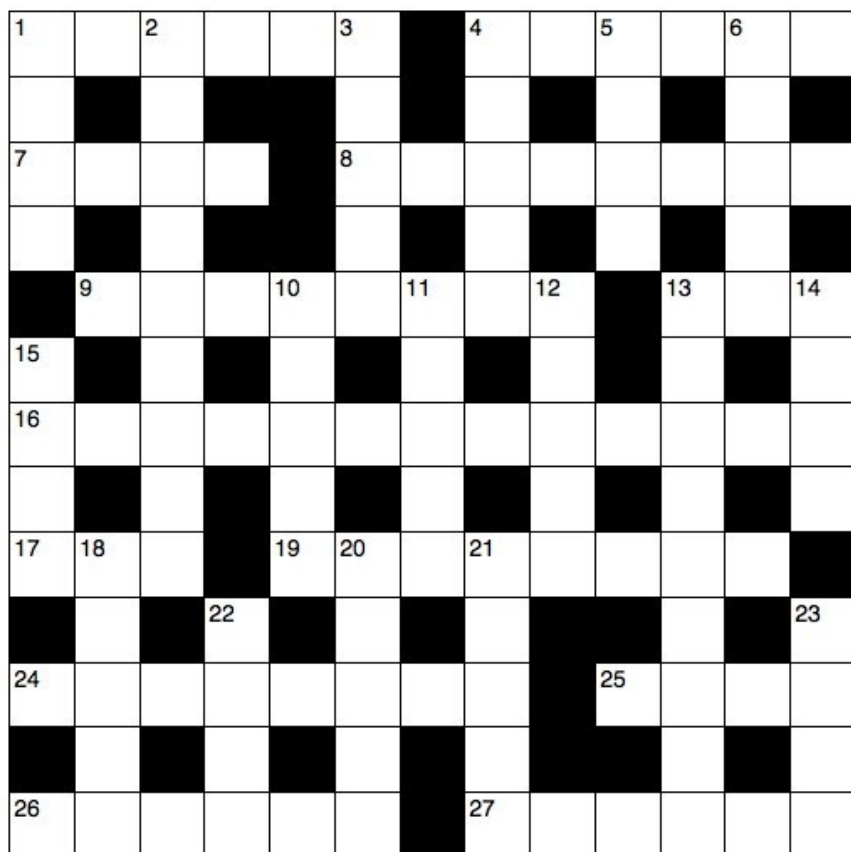

N.O.W. MISSION AND CARE GROUP

When, towards the end of the first decade of the 21st century, the United Reformed Church voted in favour of abolishing District Councils Synods and were invited to reimagine how churches could work together. The Yorkshire Synod created Mission and Care Groups.

Our Mission and Care Group has recently decided to change its name to the N.O.W. Mission and Care Group – the Nidd, Ouse and Wharfe. The Group consists of eight churches: The Bridge; Salem; Dacre; Bilton Grange, Harrogate; Knaresborough, West Park, Harrogate; St Paul's, Harrogate; and St Columba's, York.

The purpose of this group is to deepen the relationships between the churches in our area. Currently I serve this group as Convener and John Eveleigh serves as Secretary. Gill Chapman sits on the Pastoral Committee as the Synod Pastoral Elder to these churches.

Recently, we have completed our plan for events in 2026. Each event is designed to help us share together; some seek to develop our faith, some allow us to socialise, some invite us to worship, and others to discuss issues relevant to our churches. These meetings are open to every member of the eight United Reformed Churches who make up this Mission and Care Group. So, when you see these events advertised, the invitation is for you!

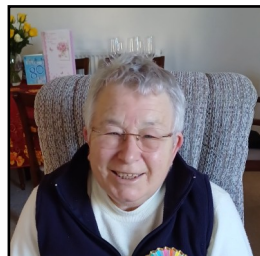

My favourite place in this country is Hornsea where we have static caravan which we visit each week. Or is it Spurn Point. Can I have 2?

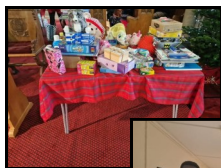
Where in the world would you like to visit?
