Messenger letter

Dear Friends,

In April I fulfilled an ambition that I have had since I was at Secondary School. Whilst on a visit to Paris the friend I was travelling with surprised me with a trip to the Palace of Versailles. Versailles has a long history, not least, with the Sun King, Louis XIV, who expanded the palace well beyond the Hunting Lodge of Louis XIII. It is a glorious building but for me there was just one room I longed to visit, The Hall of Mirrors. In this room the leaders of the victorious Allied Powers gathered after the First World War to create a treaty that would punish Germany and make a future war impossible. On 28th June 1919 the German government signed the treaty that Woodrow Wilson, of the United States, Georges Clemenceau of France and David Lloyd-George of the United Kingdom, had spent five months crafting. The 440 clauses were harsh and whilst, at the time it was signed, many cheered the conclusion of a war that had left Europe devastated the treaty sowed seeds of resentment in Germany and from those seeds a future, more global conflict, would grow.

We now approach a solemn moment in our liturgical and national calendar, Remembrance. We are invited to take time out of the busy routine of our lives to remember the cost of the conflicts of the $20^{\rm th}$ century, conflicts that left such deep scars across the world. This remembrance will be focused on a two-minute silence held at 11am on Remembrance Sunday and, then again, at the $11^{\rm th}$ hour of the 11th day of the $11^{\rm th}$ month. We will remember those who lives were sacrificed in war and that remembrance also invites us to commit to honoring those lives by striving for peace.

What is peace? Is it merely the absence of conflict, the silence of the guns of war? The legacy of Versailles tells us it must be more than that, peace must go hand in hand with justice. Justice that the Prophet Amos describes as rolling down like waters with righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. Peace and justice cannot be separated.

As I write this there is a negotiation in Egypt seeking to bring an end to the genocide in Gaza. It will not be peace if the guns fall silent, but the occupation continues and the attacks on Israel continue. Peace, with justice, can only be achieved when human beings on opposing sides sit down together and see each other as human beings; decide to work together as human beings; chose to live together as human beings. When we pause on Remembrance Sunday and, then again, on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month we are not only pausing to remember the past, but we are also pausing to honour the past with a commitment to building a better future.

A future world living together in a just peace is possible if we pray for it, demand it and strive for it. If we honour the past and truly remember them!








A short story from the Bible

WORDSEARCH

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8^{th} century to Fife and preserved at a church in a place now named St Andrews.

Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many fervent Jews at the time Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed out Jesus to Andrew and his friend, and described him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men assumed that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So as Jesus made off, they followed him.

When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about his current place of residence: 'where are you staying?'

The reply of Jesus was the most straight-forward invitation anyone can receive: 'Come and see'. So they did, and the results of their response were life changing. For Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and soon the little apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed. And right at the front of the

column, as it were, was Andrew, the first disciple of Jesus.

N.O.W. MISSION AND CARE GROUP

When, towards the end of the first decade of the 21st century, the United Reformed Church voted in favour of abolishing District Councils Synods and were invited to reimagine how churches could work together. The Yorkshire Synod created Mission and Care Groups.

Our Mission and Care Group has recently decided to change its name to the N.O.W. Mission and Care Group – the Nidd, Ouse and Wharfe. The Group consists of eight churches: The Bridge; Salem; Dacre; Bilton Grange, Harrogate; Knaresborough, West Park, Harrogate; St Paul's, Harrogate; and St Columba's, York.

The purpose of this group is to deepen the relationships between the churches in our area. Currently I serve this group as Convener and John Eveleigh serves as Secretary. Gill Chapman sits on the Pastoral Committee as the Synod Pastoral Elder to these churches.

Recently, we have completed our plan for events in 2026. Each event is designed to help us share together; some seek to develop our faith, some allow us to socialise, some invite us to worship, and others to discuss issues relevant to our churches. These meetings are open to every member of the eight United Reformed Churches who make up this Mission and Care Group. So, when you see these events advertised, the invitation is for you!

The Hollybush Project

This is a transcript of the talk given by Carrie, one of the support staff at the Hollybush project who have been our church charity for the last two years.

The Hollybush Project has been running at the Hollybush Conservation Centre since 2003. The scheme is open to people over eighteen who have learning disabilities and are eligible to receive day care from Leeds City Council Adult Services.



They are based in the building erected by Joseph Whitwell who pioneered forcing rhubarb in the 1860's and there is a blue plaque on the building to commemorate this. The 'farm' was ideally located between the canal and the railway line.

The project aims to develop and facilitate engaging group activities for the participants. There are lots of gardening opportunities on site, there is a polytunnel, which as well as providing place to grow plants, also provides shelter from the sun on hot days and a place to keep warm when it is cold. There are several courtyard containers and several beds and a sales space which is kept well stocked.

Cooking takes place in the classroom using products grown mostly on site, cakes are baked and chutneys and soups made, sometimes being consumed by the group members or for sale at the summer plant sale of the Christmas Fair.

In recent times, Asda at Adel have been donating plants which have not been sold, these can be nursed back to health and are planted into the gardens or sold in the sales area.

Many of the team work in the woodwork area. There is nothing that they cannot make, and items include seats, potting benches, planters, bird boxes and Christmas trees. Some of the artwork is amazingly detailed. They are a resilient lot and work through all weathers.

There are some talented musicians in the group. Abba is a particular favourite and dancing and singing can go on for several hours. The group have also been known to engage

in 'bridge singing' along the canal which is a nice place to walk and easy to access with it being adjacent to Hollybush – the faces of passing pedestrians are a picture.

The Project entered the Harrogate Flower show in April 2024 and gained a three-star certificate for their efforts. The group had enjoyed making mood boards, mock ups and growing the plants and making the woodwork items.

In the autumn of 2024, the group were pleased to be involved with the Leeds International Piano Competition. Besprode Pianos donated pianos that were no longer playable, and they were planted up with plants and placed around the Leeds area. The Hollybush Piano found pride of place right outside Leeds City Museum. The piano made its way back to the Hollybush garden at the end of the event.

A stone mason visited during the autumn of 2024 and everyone ended up looking like ghosts, but had a lot of fun – even the sweepings up were used in the Hollybush garden. Kate from Bee Inspired offered some workshops in March 2025 to explain why bees are so important and there was an opportunity to dress up, taste some honey and do some craftwork.

The summer Plant Sale in May 2025 attracted over four hundred visitors and many plants grown by the groups and items of woodwork were sold.

Future projects include a Natural Dye and Medicinal Herb Garden, the herb spiral is already complete and various farmhouse bathroom items are to be used as planters. Plants are being grown in the gardening sessions and resources are being accumulated from other groups at Sunnybank Mills and Armley Mills. We are also learning about dyeing.

The donations which have been received by the Hollybush Project have transformed the experience for the group members. Things which have been purchased include a new wheelbarrow, secateurs, trugs, gardening gloves, woodwork supplies including stains, screws, drill and bits, sandpaper, craft and card making supplies as well as contributing to the overall running of the project.


